Esau was a hunter. Jacob was a shepherd.

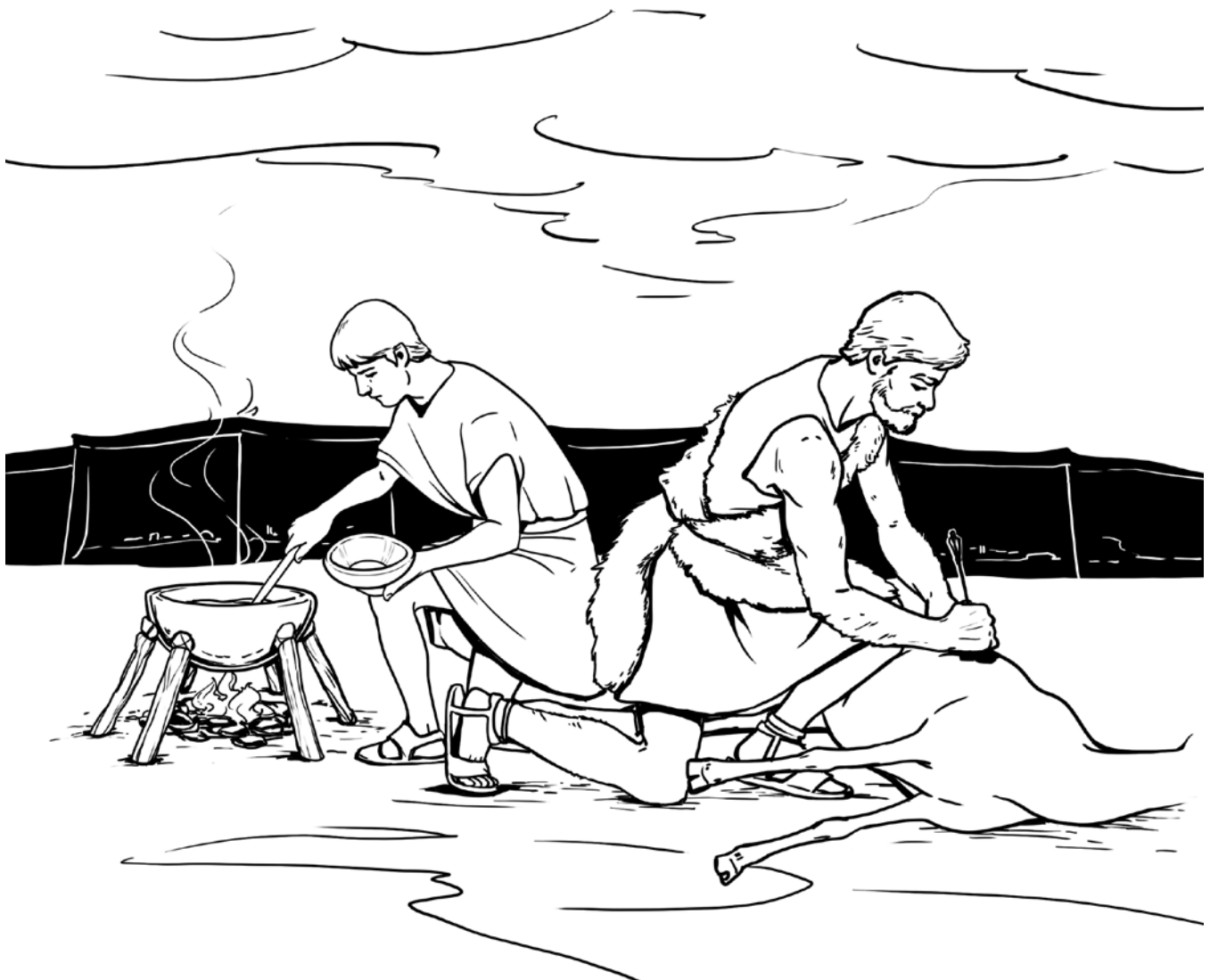


Esau sells his birthright for a bowl of soup.

Because Jacob resorted to lying, he had to run for his life! But



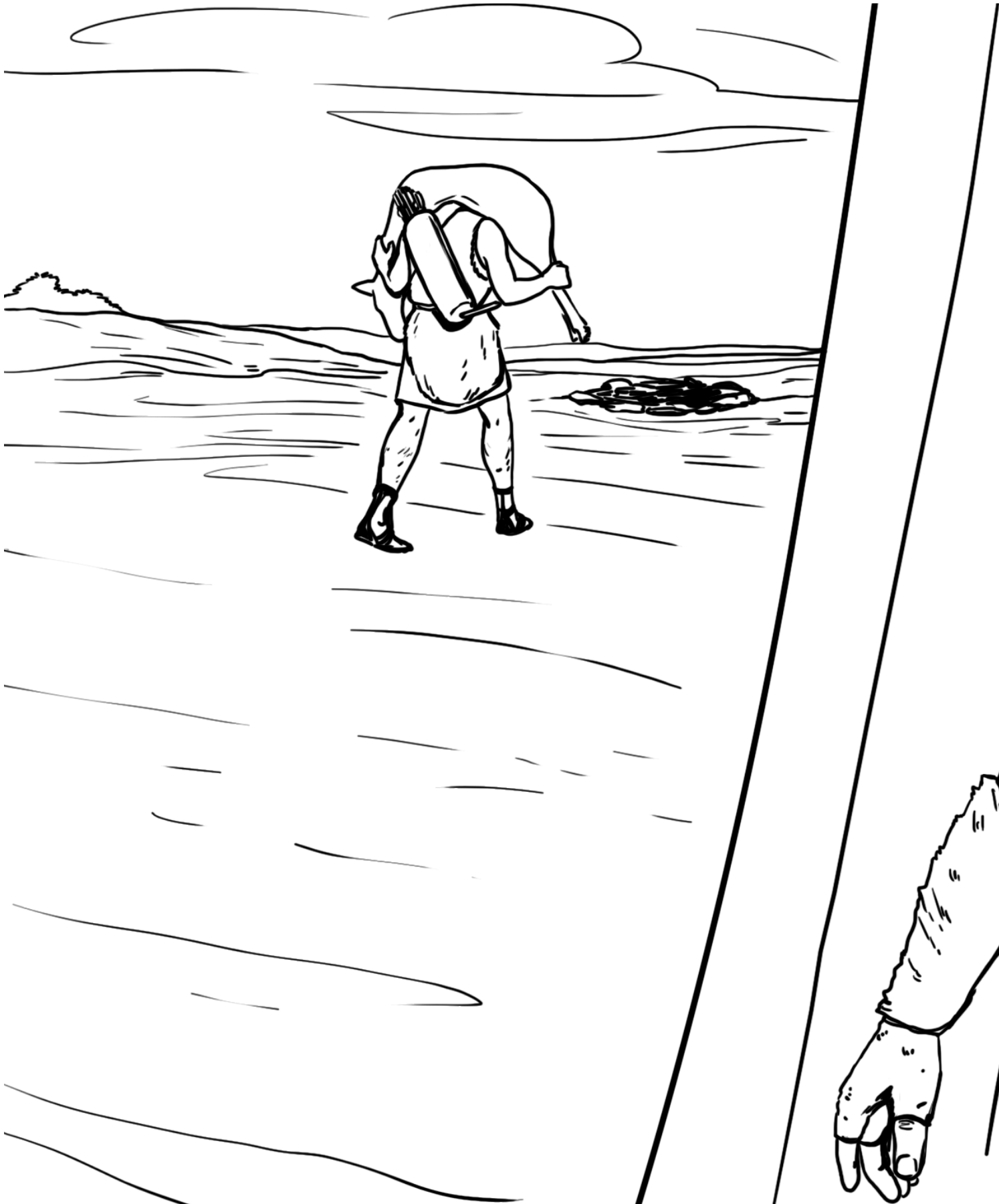
Jacob makes soup and Esau hunts.

he did have admirable qualities, and God determined to carry out a special part of His plan through Jacob.

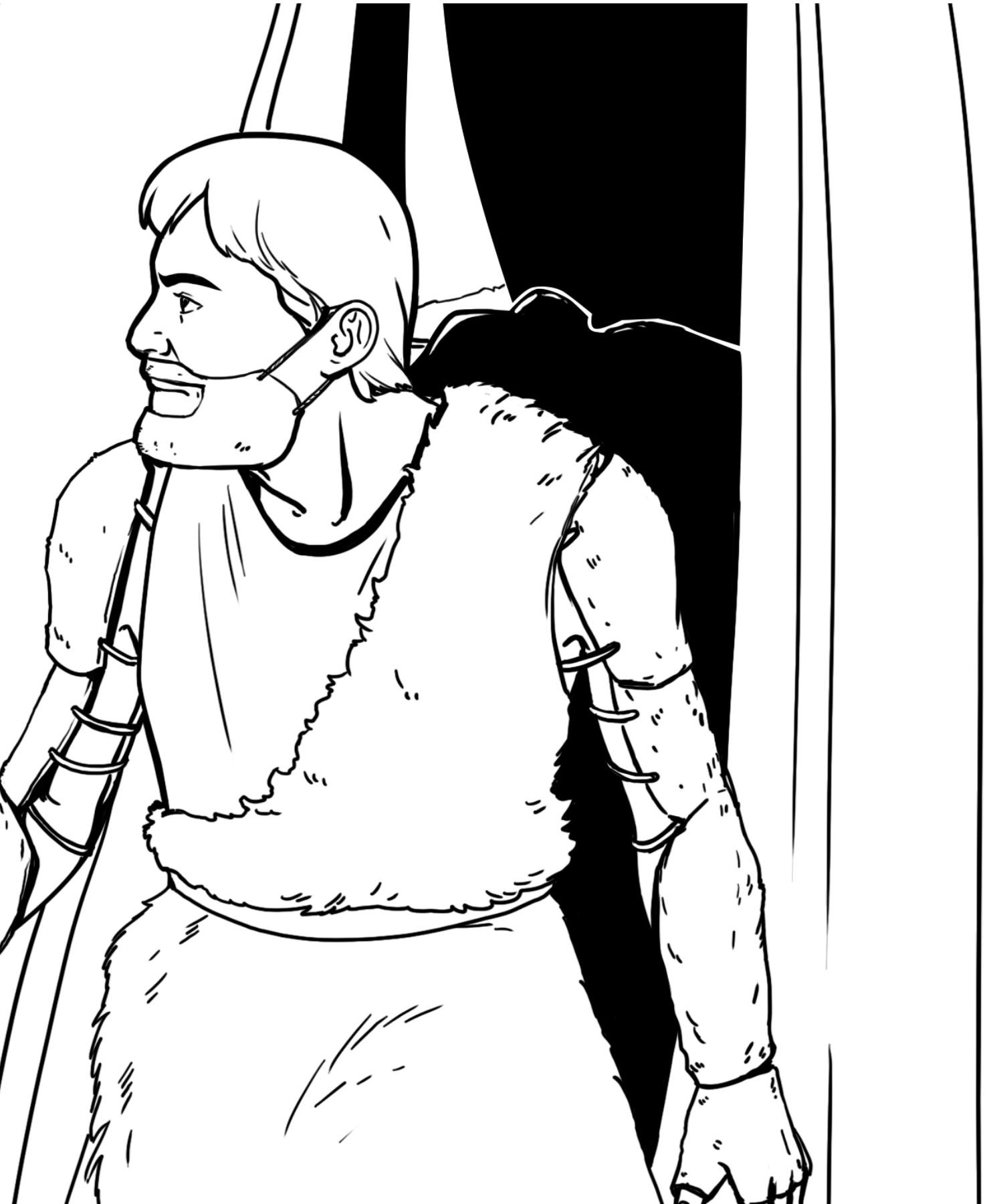
